According to the CDC, about 30–50 people are killed by dogs each year in the United States. In 2020, 46 people were killed.

The number of deaths from dog attacks appears to be increasing. From 2018– 2021, 226 people were killed from being bitten or struck by a dog. This represents a 131% increase in fatal dog attacks between 2018 and 2021.

The Pit Bull is responsible for the most fatal attacks in the U.S.. Over a 13-year period, Pit Bulls killed 284 people, which is 66% of total fatalities. However, Pit Bulls only account for 6.5% of the total U.S. dog population.

About 4.5 million Americans are bitten by dogs every year. Of these, more than 800,000 people per year report requiring medical attention for their dog bites.


